History Alive: Communities Around Orlando

From Metro Orlando's early days as a citrus-growing hub to its modern role as a melting pot of cultures, our area has always been shaped by the people who call it home. Learn about communities around Orlando with family-friendly activities and guided tours. Activities include creating your own historic postcard, devising the pioneer wagon you'd choose to traverse the frontier, and learning about the sometimes surprising produce that's been grown in Central Florida, from celery and citrus to pineapples.

From Pinewood to Pillars: Orange County's Historic Courthouses

Saturday, February 1 - Sunday, April 27, 2025

Our newest pocket exhibit features rarely seen artifacts from our collection, showcasing the halls of justice that shaped not only Orlando's skyline but also its history. Downtown Orlando's courthouses have been at the epicenter of the city and county's history for over 160 years, dating back to the area's earliest settlers. As the small frontier town that became the county seat expanded into a bustling metropolis, courthouses grew in size and sophistication to meet the community's needs. From Pinewood to Pillars traces the evolution of Orange County's courthouses, from the rustic, log-hewn buildings of Orlando's pioneer days to the towering, state-of-the-art structure ushering in the new millennium.

Lunch & Learn: A Recipe for Revenge

Friday, February 7, 2025, Noon – 1 p.m.

The Barber-Mizell Feud of 1870 marked one of the most significant episodes in Central Florida history. Join William "Billy" Morgan to learn how two influential families, the Barbers and the Mizell's clashed during the Reconstruction years over cattle, land, and authority, culminating in a deadly conflict that rocked the region and left a decades-long legacy.
